COVID-19 Vaccine Seems to Be Safe for Pregnant Persons So Far, But More Research Is Needed, Study Says

Preliminary findings have not shown obvious safety concerns among pregnant persons who received mRNA COVID-19 vaccines, but additional research is necessary over a longer period of time and with more participants to make further conclusions, say the authors of an April 21, 2021 study in *The New England Journal of Medicine*.
