Global Prevalence of Young-Onset Dementia Higher than Previously Estimated, Study Suggests

Young-onset dementia, a diagnosis made in people under 65, reached a worldwide prevalence of 119 people per 100,000 among those 30 to 64 years of age, according to a July 19, 2021, report in JAMA Neurology.

Rapid response teams decrease rates of cardiopulmonary arrest outside of the intensive care unit (ICU), and may decrease mortality or ICU transfer rate, though evidence for the latter is mixed, say the authors of a June 24, 2021, study in *JAMA*.
